

# FRANK COOPER SANDS AWARD

Frank Cooper Sands, revered as the Founding Father of the Scout movement in Singapore, he established the first local troop, the First Sands Troop on 2 July 1910.

In over a hundred years, the Scouting movement in Singapore grown into a nationwide organisation with over 11,000 members representing 12 districts and four areas.

In 1995, the Singapore Scout Association (SSA) instituted the Frank Cooper Sands Award in his name to commemorate the legacy of our founding Scoutmaster and awards it to proficient Scout units across the nation. To be awarded a Gold Award is testament to the unit's excellence in administration, participation and training standards, among others.

The inaugural Frank Cooper Sands Award ceremony was held in 1996 at the Singapore Indoor Stadium. Catholic High Scout Group was one of the few units to be awarded Gold in that year. Our GSL, Mr Andrew Chua received the award on behalf of the troop from Mr Abdullah Tarmugi, the then Minister of Communication Development. Since then, Catholic High Scout Group achieved 20 consecutive Gold awards since its inception. As the SPL, I was honoured to be given the opportunity to lead the troop to receive its 15th Gold award.

Penning down this article five years after graduating from Catholic High, one cannot help but look back at his days as a Catholic High Scout. Winning awards and titles are joyful and momentous occasions, but they are never the driving force in our troop. Instead, it is the principles we adopt, the friendships we forge and the experiences we share that will live long in our memories when the photographs fade and the

trophies tarnish. While we pride ourselves on being able to attain this prestigious Gold award every year, we know for certainty that our real strength lies in our troop's ability to equip our Scouts with lifelong values and skills that will stay with them long after they have left the school.

If Frank Cooper Sands is alive today, he would be marvelled at the evolution of Scouting in Singapore. What started out as a tiny troop comprising of 30 white sons has now transformed into a prominent organisation with membership of over 11,000 youths.

May the Scouting spirit continue to burn bright for Catholic High Scout Group and for the rest of Singapore.

mix. We would then cook rice using the broth and pandan leaves to add fragrance to it. We would finish off with a dessert, which was a refreshing watermelon sprite drink.




#### National Patrol Camp





During that camp, we were also tasked to overcome daily obstacles as a patrol, and it was in that filthy, fatigued and stressed state that, for the first time, I saw the true colours of friends

and started building bonds. I had the privilege of participating in the NSPC, NPC, and a Tower Building Competition. During the training leading up to those competitions, training often continued for long hours and one valued the sweetness of water during water breaks, something that we take for granted every day. As a venture scout, Siauw Wei Long was instrumental in training me in archery. The constant hollering and whipping by the arrow taught me that training environments were often harsh but necessarily so. The process is usually not fun, but in retrospect, the outcome made the experience memorable. After all my years as a scout, that journey has inspired me to continue to pursue new experiences and adventures and to always be prepared.

Every year, I still catch up with my past scouting buddies. Although we have moved on to different paths in life, we still see the personality and character of that young scout that we once used to work with, all those years ago.

最终,目的是要培养出一群



The gateway is the star of the campsite. Its beauty and elegance aims to captivate the crowd and the complexity of a 3D structure augments the excitement. Its design must bring out its purpose and encapsulates the spirit of the patrol/troop. And we do so by retrofitting the wooden skeleton with color-themed banners and decorations. Gateways should also have a wide base and a low centre of gravity for better stability.



The history of Catholic High Scout Troop dates back to 1948. The troop colours: white, yellow and blue, represents our motto 智,仁,勇。
Our sui generis totems portrays our achievements. The red stripes symbolizes the brotherhood amongst 8 patrols, pigeon, eagle, cobra, rhino, wolf, tiger, dolphin and shark. These are depicted on the 2016 NPC gateway – the embodiment of our crowning glories.
