
ORIENTATION

work. So what ECA should I join?





Day 2



The scouts washed and carried the canoes back to the shed immediately after they reached the beach. Paddles and life jackets were washed by the guides. As soon as we had finished


cleaning up, we gathered for a

We were divided into five patrols each headed by a President Scout candidate. At each of the five stations, we were given scenarios which required us to apply our first-aid, initiative and leadership skills. At the same time, we had to do some 'acting' and keep up the patrol spirit. At the end of the VOJ. we had evaluation on our performances and soon after, the Ventures and us went to collect firewood for backswood

cooking.

On our return, we had lunch and started to prepare for backswoods cooking and survival killing. All the scouts were assembled for a demonstration of how to slaughter various animals, namely the turtles, frogs, python and rabbit. All of us were curious about how the procedures would be like and as it turned out, it went on with the scouts riveted with the happenings.

Scouting in Germany - DPSG

It's a little bit difficult to describe Scouting in Germany, as there is nothing like the Scouting here. In Germany there are about 40 different Scout-Organizations. Three of them belong to the WOSM, which are the BdP (Bund der Pfadfinderinnen und Pfadfinder), VCP (Verband Christlicher Pfadfinder) and DPSG (Deutsche Pfadfinderschaft St. Georg).

I belong to the DPSG and so I only want to describe the DPSG, as I'm not so well informed about scouting in the other organizations.

Please excuse me, if you read some German expressions. These are something like "german-scouting-specific", so there is no way to translate them to english (or too difficult for me:)

*** THE DPSG *** (Deutsche Pfadfinderschaft Sankt Georg)

1.) History

The DPSG was founded at 7th Oct. 1929. In 1931 the DPSG had 9.000 members. The DPSG worked on the ideals of BP. From 1933 - 1938 the DPSG had to fightagainst opression through the NS-Regime. Some of their members were killed in KZ. In 1938 the DPSG was forbidden by the government. But some scouts didn't join the HJ Hitlerjugend) which adaptet the methods and outfit of scouting but had absolutely different goals! These scouts worked in the underground 'til 1945. In 1950 the WOSM made the RdP (Ring deutscher Pfad-finder, which today consists of BdP,VCP,DPSG)a member. Since this time the DPSG works active in scouting and now has about (I guess) 80.000 members and is the largest german Scouting organization.

2.) Structure

Most of the action happens in a Stamm (to be compared to a troop I think).

Here you see the structure of scouts in Germany:

Scouts from 8 - 11 years are called the WOELFLINGE.

Scouts from 11 - 13 years are called the JUNGPFADFINDER.

Scouts from 13 - 16 years are called the PFADFINDER.

Scouts from 16 - 21 years are called the ROVER.


Scouts older then 18 can become LEADERS.

Normally the groups meet once a week and do some camps in the year




Knots

Spanish Bowline



Begin by doubling a bight under the center of rope, crossing the end and forming two loops (fig.1). Draw each strand up through the loop to form two extended bights as shown in




Each bight must then be twisted in an outward direction. This is easily done by whipping them with the thumb and forefinger of each hand and turning them away from each other. A half twist puts them in position (fig.3).

Now, take each side of the lower loop. Draw this upward so they pass over and then under the strands that compose the upper loops, exactly as shown by the arrows in fig. 3.

Pull the center knot tight,

retaining the loops in their extended fashion. This forms the two-looped Spanish Bowline (fig.4). Inverted, it is gripped at the end, so that the loops dangle and can be used for lifting purposes.



Recipe

TOAD IN THE HOLE

You will need: (quantities are for four servings)

- 150g flour
- 1 egg
- half a pint of milk (approx.)
- 60g margarine
- 8 sausages
- pinch of salt

Method:

- Mix the flour, salt and egg together, adding the milk slowly until you have a smooth batter (it may not be necessary to add the full half pint of milk)
- Place the sausages and the margarine in the baking tray or home-made bowl and place in your camp oven for 15 minutes
- Pour your batter over the sausages and return to the oven for about half an hour or until the batter is a golden brown
