

National Scoutcraft and Pioneering Competition



The day of reckoning had arrived at long last: on the 10th of February 2007, the legendary Catholic High Scout Troop assembled in school for a pre-competition briefing, and the major events teams were getting ready to fight in the battle for our Troop's glory with the blessings of all our leaders at the 7th National Scoutcraft and Pioneering Competition held in Bishan Park.

Having made a final check of the equipment at the respective grounds, each of the team leaders proceeded to the Main Administration Tent for registration and then all the teams present were gathered for a Competition Briefing and a Flag-raising ceremony. The Gateway team, the Scout Bridge team, the Scout Tower team,

About two hours into the pioneering competition, a



heartening sight appeared: the teams of the Minor Events had finally arrived, come to do battle and to set new records in the events which Catholic High Scout Troop have become renown for. It was truly an encouraging spectacle for the weary pioneering teams, as now everyone was together to fight for glory as one troop. The first minor events of the day to begin were both Pioneering Skills and 3-2-1 Flagpole simultaneously, led by Jit Sheng and Cuthbert

respectively. The judging of the Pioneering Skills structures would be held at the same time as that of the other pioneering events, while we were overjoyed to hear that after the heats for the 3-2-1 flagpole, our troop had made it into the finals. Next in line were the Blindfold tentage and the

Sour Grapes events, in which both teams entered the finals to our elation. Unfortunately, our Chariot Race team did not manage to secure a place in the finals, due to technical difficulties encountered during the heats itself. Finally, the Roman Cannonball event commenced









and we pinned our hopes on the team, but sadly we did not manage to clinch anything. Nevertheless, the remaining teams practised and perfected their skills to gear up for the finals in the later part of the day.

Meanwhile, the pioneering teams were entering the last stages of construction. We had been at our tasks for an arduous 7 hours without rest, and as the time of judging drew near all of us entered into a frenzied fervor as we strove to finish up all our structures in the last hour. The tension among the competitors was clearly visible, as many team leaders could be seen hurrying their men at the top of their voices. The atmosphere was charged with anxiety and excitement. As the seconds flew by, the urgency of the situation was virtually palpable, as if the entire competition ground was shrouded by a blanket of desperation, and as the time drew ever closer, the clamoring voices grew louder, the movements became more frantic...until, finally, a voice boomed over the megaphone," All pioneering teams, your time is up. Please keep away from your structures and prepare for the judging." As we stepped to back to admire our masterpieces after a grueling 8 hours, we were confident and proud that, truly, these were the best projects we had ever done. Sitting down in the shade for a break at long last, we received disappointing news of the competition for the Roman Cannonball, where we failed to attain any accolades. However, all of us remained sanguine as we awaited the judges decision on the best projects of the Competition.

While waiting for the prize-giving ceremony, the Troop congregated at the minor events competition ground, where we found that our Sour Grapes team had snagged a Bronze from strong competitors from other Troops. We cheered wildly for the remaining two teams, 3-2-1 flagpole and the Blindfold Tentage team. Regrettably, to our chagrin our 3-2-1 flagpole team was disqualified, as they could have easily nabbed at least a silver in the 3-2-1 flagpole event. Despite this loss, we were ecstatic to hear that our Blindfold team had fought hard and triumphed, claiming our first gold of the day. Immediately after that, all the Troops present were gathered to the front of the main tents where the prizegiving ceremony commenced. The prizes for the minor events were given out first, and we cheered wildly for the Sour Grapes and Blindfold Tentage teams, sharing in their elation. All had their fingers crossed and were fervently praying for nothing but the Challenge Shields as the announcer proceeded to announce the various troops taking home prizes for the pioneering events. All members of Catholic High Scout Troop were overjoyed to hear that every single one of our 5 pioneering events had garnered a gold, and were even more overcome with jubilation as 4 pioneering teams, the Gateway, Scout Bridge, Venture Tower and Venture Bridge, had received Challenge Shields which recognised the most outstanding project of that particular event. However, we were devastated to hear that our Scout Tower had failed to receive a Challenge Shield, losing by a narrow margin to Gan Eng Seng Scout Troop. Then, the moment we had all been waiting for had come at long last: the Overall Challenge Trophy was to be given out to the Troop with the best performance in the whole competition. As we all held our breaths in anticipation, the announcer shouted into the microphone, "Catholic High Scout Troop!" As one troop, we knelt and bellowed the "Mercy" cheer until our throats went hoarse as we received the much-coveted Overall Challenge Trophy. All of us were overcome with a wave of jubilation and it was a sensation of joy that everyone shared at that moment. It was elation, it was camaraderie, it was an unbreakable bond: in short, it was our Troop Spirit.

We owe all of our success as well to the tireless efforts of our Leaders, and to our Scout teachers-incharge. Finally, and above all, we must attribute our success to God, who led us through the countless hours of preparation and the Competition day itself. Lastly, as I pen these words, I hope and pray for another occasion when we will once again be able to stand triumphant, just as we had done on the 10th of February, 2007.





I would transport myself into each song and story, living the life of a mountain climber, an oarsman in a Viking ship or a horse-riding cowboy. My dreams of new worlds eventually came through when 2106 organised a trip to Thailand! As a young boy of 12, I was able to travel to the land of a thousand smiles in a company of some of my best friends. I remembered the spiciness of tom yam soup, the awe-inspiring statues

I thank my scoutmasters, particularly Mr Andrew Chua, for making my cadet scout experience such an enriching one. I am glad that many more young boys continue to benefit from the cadet scout program and the guidance of the Adult Leaders of 2106. National Patrol Camp 2008







BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO RAFT BUILDING

In this section, you will find 2 articles on how to build a barrel raft from materials that can easily be obtained. It is good to note that the directions for constructing your own "Titanic" mentioned here are merely guidelines, and are not set in stone. Please pardon the expression, but in essence it is a "crash course" on making your very first water-borne craft. So feel free to experiment and have fun! (Life jackets not included.)

We didn't end up using "wedges" to keep the barrel form moving. I would recommend making the raft longer so that you can have a middle row of barrels. Having the barrels touch in addition to the longer waterline will make the homemade raft much faster.

BUILD YOUR OWN BARREL RAFT

[This article details from a first hand perspective the steps in building a raft with mostly artificial materials.]

We built a raft out of 55 gallon plastic drums and plywood. The drums are attached to the wooden platform with steel cables. Originally, we tried to lash the barrels to the frame, but they came off in the water, and it was not stable enough.


CONSTRUCTION

We decided to put two 2x4s perpendicular to the plywood, and attached the barrels to the 2x4s, and we repeated this in the back. We used 4 bolts on each 2x4 to attach them to the plywood. We have learned it is helpful to over engineer everything we build. We made little metal 'flaps' that we epoxied to the barrels and ran the steel cable through them so that the barrels would not slip. The steel cable is tightened with clamps and then affixed to long eye bolts going through the 2x4s. We did not, but you may have to put blocks under the barrels to help keep them in place.

PROPULSION

We have not figured out how to steer it or sail/row it. I did find some plans for some quick, cheap oars, I'm not sure if they will work. When we tested the raft, we just paddled it with canoe paddles, since this is painfully slow, we are going to build oars. We have learned from our experience with the beachcamper that we need to make sure it can fit on or in a car and it can be lifted.

[On the other hand, this article provides a more "primitive" way of constructing your raft.]

MATERIALS REQUIRED

- · Something to cut the wood with (a hatchet)
- · Logs (spruce is recommended)
- · Heavy twine
- Leaves
- · 4 empty water jugs

STEPS IN BUILDING THE RAFT

Step One:

First off, you will need to lay about half a dozen 12-foot long and 12-inches thick logs side-by-side on the ground. Using the hatchet, cut grooves near the ends of each log in a U shape. Each groove will need to be around 2 inches from the end of the log.

Step Two:

Place two 7" x 6' logs in the U shaped groves of the larger logs. Already your hard work should be paying off with a half built raft.

Step Three:

Wrap the heavy twine in a crisscross pattern across the large and small logs to make the raft more stable. You should be able to stay afloat on the waters now.

Step Four:

Now that your raft is secured with twine, flip it over so that the smaller logs are on the bottom.

Step Five:

Using the plastic water jugs, place them on the bottom of the raft and secure them by using heavy twine. It is a smart idea to have each jug placed in a corner of the raft to balance everything out.

Step Six:

Place leaves on the top of your raft. Lay several on top of each other making many layers of leaves. Now you will at least have some better cushioning and a stylish new look when compared to a plain raft. However, the danger is that leaves can get slippery when wet.
