
Girl Venture


The district commissioner, Catherine Heng, came on the 8 of November 2003 to interview us. We had to wait a bit as she first talked to our Group Scout Leader


After the interview, the district commissioner told us that we made it for the DCA.

badge. It is a badge that allows you to show off your skills in fighting, literally. As the name implies, to earn this badge, there are a few pre-requisites. You will need to be familiar the types of weapons used in combat, how is it used, how it is used under safely guidelines and how to ensure the tool is in proper conditions. A few common weapons you can find in your daily life are knives, rods, axes and spears.

Although this badge is commonly associated with fighting and blood shed, but this is actually not the case. This badge tests your ability to differentiate weapons, and the markings they leave after usage. For example, the cut on a block of wood using a parang and axes are different. Candidates are required to be able to differentiate the wounds caused by some simple weapons.

Also, candidates are required to be able to defend themselves from aggressors without using weapons (unarmed combat). These basic techniques could be easily learnt from martial arts textbooks, preferably one with picture illustrations. A few schools of martial arts accepted are Judo, Tae Won Do, Karate, Ninja etc.

It is important to note that all the forms of martial arts recommended are not meant aggression, but for strictly self-defense only.

I got my master at arms through teak won do. I am currently a black belt recognized by the world Tae Won do federation. During my scouting years, I was only a red belt. In order to get this badge, one must be red belt and above for the case of tae won do.


Identification on the certificate is very important, it is the only valid proof of one's skills.

In tae won do, I was taught the various techniques of self-defense, how to unarm a opponent, fall an opponent, evade from opponents etc. Focus was placed on the basic kicking and punching techniques. It is indeed not easy to throw a punch to knock out an opponent bigger than you are, but if the techniques are right, you will be able to control your force, and might be able to knock him off. Fatal points of the human physique are also taught. Regions like the sternum, the throat and the groin are exceptionally vulnerable, and one would be wise to guard these regions from attacks. Stability is also

Concepts related to lowering the CG of human bodies are taught to allow me to remain standing after a strong push. Finally, and most importantly, the dos and don'ts in real life situations are explained. Tae won do is a skill, thus no one can perfect it, it has to come with constant training, or one will turn rusty. Skill itself is also not enough to deter attacks, fitness is also very important.

Introduction



It dwarfs the average human and leaves them wide-mouthed in surprise as they gape at the astonishing height to which the tower can climb to, or they marvel at how large and sturdy a bridge can be built to. Pioneering is in short a must-have ability of any scout, it is a sense of identity in which we can take pride in as we consider the respect we gain from the public who receives this insightful wonder.

Introduction to the testwork

Basically the pioneering testwork can be said to be the most interesting testwork in your years of scouting. This testwork requires the construction of either an aerial runway, a bridge or a tower. With of course the aid of your patrol.


The Test

In this case I have chosen to explain the construction of a very simple project namely the monkey bridge. This is by far the simplest of all bridges and requires very little effort to bring up.



Steps to take


 Construct an "A" Frame using three pieces of wood.



- 2. Superimpose the second "A" Frame on top of the first one
- 3. Tie guylines to each of the protruding end at the top of the "A" these guylines must be tied to the other "A" Frame too. As shown in the picture these lines will serve as railings for the bridge.
- 4. Next set the two "A" Frames some distance apart in an upright position and knock intings to hold them in place.
- 5. Now Thread a thick guyline through the intersection of both the "A" Frames, tie this guyline to the intersection of the "A" Frames
- Secure all guylines to the ground by knocking intings into the ground and tying the guylines to it.
- 7. Use nylon to create a safety net by zig-zaging the nylon through the railings and the main guyline.

Other aspects of pioneering


- Decorations: deco can be used to liven up any structure built. It creates a "feel-good" effect on all who view the structure. Simple deco can be the use of flags and different coloured ropes/ wood while more difficult deco involves large banners.
 - Large banners: Banners are a very good way
 to create an imposing feel to your structure.
 These banners require a lot of work to finish
 basically it involves pasting of stickers on
 large pieces of cloth, the stickers can be
 pictures of majesty or the names of the school
 or organization by which the structure was
 constructed.




- Flags: Flags are the best way to catch one's eye. The flag has always been a symbol for respect and it will definitely spice up the structure in terms of its beauty.
- 2. Knots: The knowledge of knots are a must for all who proclaim themselves as scouts pioneering is the only other testwork which focuses so much on knots other than the knots testwork. Basically there are knots for every purpose be it to secure two pieces of wood together or to join many pieces of wood together to create a platform.
 - Square Lash: This is the most basic of all pioneering knots, it is used to secure two pieces of wood together in an "X" fashion.
 - Diagonal lash: Similar to the square lash it is also used to hold two pieces of wood in the same way but is much more flexible than the square lash
 - Sheer lash: Used to join wood vertically together this way a piece of wood can be lengthened through this method.
 - Figure of Eight a.k.a Tripod knot: As the name suggests used to tie tripods it is also the most flexible of all knots it allows the wood to be moved freely even after it is tied.
 - Snake and ladder: A very important knot, it is used to tie many pieces of wood together to create a platform.
 All pioneering achievers must know this knot very well.
